Course Title: Honors 299: Human Pregnancy (3 credits)

Textbook: -none

Credit Hours: 3 undergraduate credits.

Course Description: This course introduces students to human developmental processes and the bio/psycho/social nature of pregnancy. The study of pregnancy includes psychological and biological systems, individual cognitive and affective processes and sociocultural models and influences.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:
1. Understand the biopsychosocial framework including biological,
psychological, and sociocultural and life cycle forces concerning pregnancy.
2. Examine the interactive quality of nature and nurture and consistence of
each within the biopsychosocial framework.
3. Examine behavioral and cognitive changes associated with pregnancy.
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the physiological processes including physical,
motor and perceptual development from conception through infancy.
5. Understand and assess the stages of pregnancy including the symbiotic
relationship between mother and offspring.
6. Identify characteristics affecting emotions, temperament, and mood during
pregnancy.
7. Recognize and diagnose social contexts of pregnancy development
including systems such as peer group, family structure, and cultural diversity.
8. Identify teratogens and their relationship to pregnancy sickness.
9. Consider issues including sexual behavior, delivery meds and nursing.
10. Understand and assess body changes, and healthy ways to promote body

10. Understand and assess body changes, and healthy ways to promote body image changes.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Cutting Edge Journal Article review, response, and search: for each section, 1 research article will be reviewed and summarized. A careful reading, summary and discussion of the article –see rubric below- in relation to the topic area. 2 pg responses in APA. (30% of final grade).

Midterm and Final: a combination of multiple choice, short answer and essay questions. (50% of grade).

- 1. 10 articles must be completed.
- 2. All 10 articles will be critically read.
- 3. Use the following format:
 - a. Full APA bibliographic citation
 - b. Categorization of article using the pyramid of scientific evidence
 - c. Review of method section
 - d. How credible is the argument/evidence they use to support their position?
 - e. Summary of article
 - f. Main point (finding using P value)
 - g. How does this add to/or differ from material given in class?
- 4. The APA citation of all articles must be used in-text and referenced.
- 5. Responses will be handed 1 week after Topic is covered in class with the related article or a 0 will be recorded no exceptions.
