



MSED in Adolescence Education (initial cert.)

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Purpose of the Program

This program provides those with a bachelor's degree in a content subject the opportunity to become initially certified to teach that subject in grades 7-12 in New York. It provides certification in English, math, social studies, Spanish, biology, chemistry, physics, Latin, earth science, French or physics. Upon completion of this program, students may apply for 7-12 certification in New York through our Office of Field Services.

Objectives & Goals

Graduates of the Adolescence Education program will:

- have acquired a strong foundation in developmental learning theories, pedagogy, principles of classroom management, and sound educational research for use in adapting curriculum and teaching to support the learning and development of all adolescents.
- have achieved mastery of content knowledge needed to create instructional opportunities that will enable and motivate all students to understand and apply knowledge, skills, and ideas to real-world issues.
- be able to apply their content knowledge and skills to construct learning opportunities, supportive of a diverse student population.
- know and be able to utilize a variety of formal and informal assessment techniques to evaluate learning.
- continue to be reflective practitioners who exhibit commitment to the profession's code of ethics.

Clinical Experience

Students engage in authentic clinical experience in schools during the summer and fall semesters. In many cases, clinical experience can be completed within a job placement at a 7-12 school. During the student teaching semester, students will be placed in 7-12 school settings for the entire semester, teaching in each placement. Student teaching is a full-time commitment for a semester. There is a placement in grades 7-9, and one in grades 10-12.

All Coursework is Online

All coursework is presented 100% online. New York state education requirements for clinical experiences and student teaching are not completed online, but occur in 7-12 school placements convenient for each student.

Admission Requirements

1. A bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university. Official transcripts are required showing proof of degree and all courses taken (3.00 GPA out of 4.00 is the working standard).
2. Successful completion of at least six semester hours of university level credit in each of the following content areas: English, math, science, social studies, and a language other than English. Sign language may be used for the language requirement.
3. Thirty semester hours in an arts or sciences major in the subject area of teaching certification. Business majors do not qualify.
4. A personal interview and writing sample.
5. Two letters of recommendation: one letter related to your ability to do graduate work and one letter from someone who has observed your work with children.
6. Modern Language candidates are required to take the Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) prior to or upon admission.
7. Transcript review completed by program director.
