SBU Convocation	August 27, 2025	Faculty and staff gathered at the university to learn about updates on the new strategic plan for the university and to kick off the fall semester.
Remote Area Medical (RAM) Clinic	September 13, 2025 to September 14, 2025	All SBU Nursing Students, alongside faculty, participated in the RAM Clinic at the Olean Family YMCA. The free dental, vision, and medical services allowed 415 patients to be seen and treated.
Fall Break	October 13, 2025 to October 14, 2025	Students will have a fall break, and classes will resume on Wednesday, October 15 th .
Mental Health First Aid	October 20, 2025	This certificate comes at no cost to the students and will be taught by the SBU Nursing and Occupational Therapy department faculty. Students will learn about strategies to help someone who is experiencing a mental health crisis.
MEP Poster Presentations	November 17, 2025	Soon-to-be graduating second-year MEP students will present a Quality Improvement Project that was formulated with local nurse leaders.
Kaplan NCLEX-RN 4-Day Review Course	December 8, 2025 to December 11, 2025	Second-year MEP students will complete a 4-day training course for their upcoming NCLEX-RN exams. They will complete a series of practice questions and formulate a study plan with a live instructor.
MEP Scope Ceremony	December 13, 2025	The second graduating MEP cohort will receive their Master of Science in Nursing. They will have a family member place their stethoscope around their neck to symbolize their new scope of practice as a nurse while honoring their support system. This ceremony symbolizes their new scope of practice as a future registered nurse.

Program Outcomes



The second cohort of Dual Degree in Nursing Students achieved a 100% pass rate on the NCLEX-RN exam this past summer



First-year MEP students (Christelle Valentine, Gabriella Alvarez, Kristan Moshier, and Emily Keating) completed training in palliative care with End-of-Life Nursing Education Consortium (ELNEC) modules built into targeted nursing courses.

Faculty Outcomes for 2024:

- Teaching: 90% of nursing faculty will be a 3.8 or higher for overall course evaluation scores as reported on the annual faculty evaluation form. **MET.** The average score our faculty receive in all nursing classes combined is 4.4/5!
- Scholarship: 90% of nursing faculty will score a combined 120 points or higher for teaching, scholarship, and service on the annual faculty evaluation form. MET. The average points earned was 234! We've raised the bar in response.
- Faculty Quality: 90% of faculty will maintain nursing practice hours, certifications and/or licensure as reported on the annual faculty evaluation form. MET. Actual level of achievement is 100%.
- Service: 100% of nursing faculty will attend all faculty meetings or provide evidence of reading the meeting minutes. MET. Actual level of achievement is 100%.
