### Major Information

The Department of English offers courses in English and American literature and in creative and professional writing. English courses are open to all students, regardless of their major.

The chief purpose of English courses is to enable you to understand, appreciate and evaluate the significant literature in the English language, as well as to develop your ability to read, write and speak English as effectively as possible. The department takes pride in the success its graduates have achieved in law, education, business, indeed, in virtually every major career area.

### Careers in English

Trade and professional associations, manufacturing firms, financial consultants, transportation and insurance companies are among the organizations that employ St. Bonaventure English graduates. Government agencies, schools, museums, colleges, social and religious organizations have also provided positions for our graduates. ### Student Activities

Opportunities for students who like to write and who want to use their ability to communicate are not lacking at St. Bonaventure.



A literary magazine, *The Laurel*, has been published continuously since its first issue in 1899. Recent distinctions have included a third-place finish behind Princeton and Harvard in the Society of Professional Journalists' 2002 Mark of

Excellence competition for the northeastern U.S. in the category of campus literary magazines appearing more than once a year. In the 2003 Mark of Excellence competition, *The Laurel* won first place.

English majors also work on the campus radio station WSBU FM, on the campus weekly newspaper, *The Bona Venture*, and on the *Bonadieu*, the campus yearbook. A number of



student and administrative organizations publish regular or occasional newsletters, and

there are always groups of kindred spirits like the English Club and the Writers' Bloc who exchange ideas, poems, and stories in less formal, but not less lively, ways. The English Department also organizes the Slam Poetry club, which regularly brings world-renowned poets to campus to share their work with students.
